Limerick's a short poems that are usually very silly.
They take their name from a city in Ireland. Limericks were inspired by word games and commonly used in poetry contests in magazines.



Limericks have a very specific form:

The first, second, and fifth lines have three "feet" and rhyme with each other.

The third and forth lines have two "feet" and rhyme with each other.

Feet, in poetry, are unit of measuring lines, usually with one stressed syllable. They form the poem's rhythm.

Many, but no all, Limericks start the first line by introducing a character and telling you where they are from.
