Shared Financial Accountability

The Ossining Library Foundation received a \$250,000 gift from the David Swope Fund, which will be used over the next three years to fund several projects including a Children's Room Learning Center, programming for Teens, and a library social worker. A portion of this gift will be added to the Foundation's endowment to allow us sustainable funding in the future (*Goal 1.1*)

The Foundation is planning several venues through which to support the library including a series of informational videos and sponsoring a screening of the documentary *The Trials of Constance Baker Motley*, which will be free of charge but with a suggested donation.

Diversification of Collections, Programs, and Services

The Library officially launched lending of musical instruments, through the donation of our community partners at Mike Risko Music School, furthering our ability to offer equitable access to the arts (*Goal 2.2*)

Allison Robbins is continuing to meet with potential vendors for our **copier contract** and is using this as an opportunity to introduce new services to the community, including offering a credit card/mobile pay capability on one of our new coin machines. (*Goal 2.3*)

Among the programs presented this month by the Adult Services department was **The Road To Homeownership for People of Color,** presented by Anthony Bailey and hosted in conjunction with The Hudson Valley Books for Humanity bookstore. Mr. Bailey spoke about purchasing a home, lending programs, and closing the racial wealth gap (*Goals 2.3, 4.1*)

A highlight of the year so far has been this year's **Summer Reading Kickoff celebration**, which was well-attended by patrons of all ages (*Goal 2.1.3*)

The Children's Room continued to refresh its collection for **diversity and relevance**, including weeding and purchasing new nonfiction titles, as well as displaying books to celebrate Pride Month and Juneteenth (*Goal 2.2*)



Diversification and Development of Staff, Board, and Volunteers

The Library welcomed Librarian I Mark Sacha to Adult Services (Goal 3)

The Library is working towards creating a new Patron Services department, which will allow for a more holistic first point of service and will provide opportunities to better use our staff members talents. Karen LaRocca-Fels, Diana Lennon, Mallory Marinaro, and Marie Trapasso have been meeting to plan for staff training and development (*Goal 3.8*)

Karen LaRocca-Fels, Mallory Marinaro, and Allison Robbins provided a refresher training to staff on our public-facing events calendar and LibInsight, the program used to track program statistics (*Goal 3.9*)

Staff participated in several high-quality professional development workshops, including "Protecting Yourselves and Your Patrons: Important Lessons for Library Leaders and Staff From School Shootings", with Dr. Steve Albrecht and NYLA's "The Impact of Racism on Community Health". (*Goal 3.2*)

Physical and Virtual Infrastructure Transformation

Karen LaRocca-Fels and Mallory Marinaro will work with ProfTech to push ahead on the installation of the modular spaces on the second floor. Molly Robbins is arranging the HVAC modifications needed for these spaces. (*Goal 5*)

Several building projects were completed that allowed for improvements of the library's physical infrastructure, including the removal of curbing at the foot of the parking circle, the installation of a new, properly oriented bookdrop, and the repair of the wall separating the library's driveway and that of 58 Croton Avenue. (Goal 5)

Allison Robbins worked with NAV Systems to verify, plan, and coordinate the cabling installation that will begin on July 11, which will help us improve and update the library's network. (*Goal 5.1*)
